





In a closed meeting on November 18th, 2024, Mayor & Council voted to not proceed with purchase of the Gilliards' land for use as a community farming space.

As deliberation on the project was done in a closed meeting, no information on why the Mayor & Council chose to not proceed has been forwarded to us.

FOR YOUR HOME

- Participate in a community garden.
- Make a bee-friendly garden in you backyard or on your balcony.
- Try to repair more things, whether it is a lamp or a sew a zipper.
- Find sustainable alternatives for your favorite items and brands.
- Do repairs yourself in your home to avoid waste.
- Choice reusable batteries such as in your remotes or cameras.
- Cut the trash. Reduce your garbage as best as you can.
- Choose greener energy in your home.
- Collect rain water for watering your plants.

FOR YOUR KITCHEN

- Cook more meals from scratch.
- Eat more organic food.
- Avoid meat and have fun finding alternatives for protein.
- Start a garden and grow your own food.
- Cut down on food waste and compost where you can.
- Find fair trade products for the exotic types of food, such as coffee and tea.
- Choose seasonal foods in your cooking.
